### **Activities during March 2016**

There was some additional test well drilling at the Lodge. There was no contamination found. However, there is still the problem of ledge in this area.

There continued to be an issue with leaks.

We continue to wait for Dubois&King to furnish the information to the state to allow them to issue a refill permit for the lower lake.

### **Mountain Lakes District Water Committee Meeting of 4/7/16**

Meeting was held from 8:00 AM to 9:00 AM on 4/7/16. Attendees: Don Drew, Bob Long, Peter Olander and Ken King. Tony Salvucci was on the phone. Scott Clang from GSRWA was a guest at the meeting.

#### **Water Status:**

Usage remains high at 40 to 50 thousand gallons per day. A section of the water main on Rogers Road was repaired but there is still a leak in that area.

#### **Lead and Copper:**

A second set of 20 tests were taken and sent off for testing. Scott talked about the new issue with lead. After the Flint Michigan situation the maximum amount of lead allowed will be zero. Which means most older homes and systems will fail.

#### **Master Plan Update:**

There was a meeting that evening to finalize the questionnaire that will be sent out to all land owners.

#### **Conolle property/spillway:**

We are waiting for the state to approve the minor changes to the spillway to allow this effort to be completed.

#### **Lower Dam Project:**

We need CCS to redo the grass on top of the dam. Bob and Don will work with Dubois&King and CCS to try and get this project Completed! However some level of monitoring will continue for months.

#### **New Business:**

We want to come up with a plan to start replacing parts of our water distribution system. Don had come up with a cost of \$20 per foot but Scott said that after testing and other issues were included it was more like \$30. He also reminded us that any significant repair/replace efforts required state approval which would require an engineered plan.
